A meeting of the City Council of Kearney, Nebraska, was convened in open and public session at 7:00 p.m. on August 10, 2010, in the Council Chambers at City Hall. Present were: Randy Buschkoetter, Vice-President of the Council; Michaelle Trembly, City Clerk; Council Members Don Kearney, Bruce Lear, and Bob Lammers. Absent: Mayor Stanley Clouse. Michael Morgan, City Manager; Michael Tye, City Attorney; Suzanne Brodine, Assistant to the City Manager; Kirk Stocker, Director of Utilities; and a police officer were also present. Some of the citizens present in the audience included: Dan Bahensky, Vicki Harper, Eric Hellriegel, Kevin Hibbs, Steve Altmaier from KGFW Radio, Kevin Hervert from Kearney Hub.

VI. REGULAR AGENDA

SPECIAL DESIGNATED LICENSE APPLICATION FROM SHOOTERS

Vice-President Buschkoetter opened for discussion the application for a Special Designated License submitted by KEARNEY SHOOTERS INC., dba Shooters in connection with their Class CK-67029 catering liquor license to dispense distilled spirits in the Ag Pavilion located at the Buffalo County Fairgrounds, 3807 Avenue N on September 18, 2010 from 3:00 p.m. until 1:00 a.m. for a reception.

This application for a Special Designated License has been submitted by Kearney Shooters in conjunction with their Class C liquor license to dispense distilled spirits for a reception to be held in the Ag Pavilion on September 18, 2010. These are typical requests for these facilities and have been granted in the past.

The owners, Tom Fuller and Kevin Hibbs, have experience with the selling and dispensing of alcohol. However, according to the Liquor Commission, it appears that on April 17, 2010 Shooters was cited for an intoxicated person consuming/possession of alcohol and on May 6, 2010 they were cited for minor consuming/possession. Police Chief Dan Lynch had some concerns and reservations.

The Council has the authority to review and either approve or deny the issuance of a special designated license for alcohol sales. If the Council chooses to approve the application, they will be forwarded to the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission for further processing. If the Council chooses to deny the application, that is the final decision and they are not forward to the Liquor Commission.

Kevin Hibbs, 2123 1st Avenue, owner/manager of Shooters presented this matter to the Council. They will continue to do as they have in the past at these wedding events to card people, use wristbands and observe. Shooters has passed every compliance check regarding IDs, etc. This will be his third event at the Fairground this year. In February they did the Cattleman's Classic which was a 5-day event and they received no complaints and did not encounter any problems. He plans on being present at this upcoming wedding event with two bartenders and another person who will be checking IDs and making sure everything goes okay.

Mr. Hibbs stated the first liquor citation occurred involving a 21st birthday celebration in April. When he became intoxicated, they cut the person off and asked them to leave. An hour later, the Police saw him in the back of a truck and he told them he had been at Shooters. The Police contacted Mr. Hibbs and had him come to the location. The Police contacted the individual's parents and he was taken home. Mr. Hibbs stated the young man had walked out of the bar on his own. He went out to the truck to check on him and the individual was not passed out and he was walking around. The individual came into the bar earlier with ten friends and when Mr. Hibbs thought that he had enough alcohol, he was cut off; they gave him some water and asked him to leave. They all left at that point and he does not know what took place in the hour following that. He did not know if they went somewhere else or if they had beer in the truck.

Mr. Hibbs stated that he had just been notified about the minor in possession by the Police. There was a traffic stop at Yanney Park at 2:00 a.m. and apparently this minor had a fake ID and she told the police officer that she had been at Shooters. He had no idea if she had been at Shooter that evening. He was not asked if this person had been at his establishment or was shown the fake ID, but only took her word for it. This was sent to the Liquor Commission but they have not contacted him yet. Mr. Hibbs stated he called the Nebraska Attorney in Lincoln the day before the Council meeting and they said they just received it in their office early last week. He will go before them at their request. He will also be in contact with his attorney as soon as he receives notification back from the State. He was not certain why these two incidents that occurred in April and May have taken so long to get to the State level. He would like to have it cleared up by now. It is his understanding that the Liquor Commission does not meet again until October, but he wants to push this through as quickly as possible to get this resolved.

Mr. Hibbs stated they run a good business. They always have a card person at the door every night and he is always there walking around every night of the week. He is not an absentee manager. He is always behind the bar and he takes it very seriously because this is his livelihood and they are doing the best job they can. He has owned/operated this business for 5½ years. They had two other over serving violations five years ago when they first opened. Since then they have taken that seriously to avoid that situation. They have always passed the compliance checks. Neither of these recent incidents happened at the location of his bar.

Council member Kearney stated that according to the City Manager there is no policy in place regarding these pending violations. He was not aware that a liquor catering approval is one of the few situations where the Council has local authority to approve or deny in which case it would not be forwarded to the Liquor Commission for consideration.

City Manager Michael Morgan asked Mr. Hibbs if he received a citation from the police on either occasion. Mr. Hibbs replied when he was called to the location of the truck, the officer said he was going to forward this information to the Liquor Commission. When he was contacted on the MIP by the police, they told him to be on the look out for fake Arizona driver's licenses. He was not cited by the police department for either incident.

City Attorney Michael Tye stated that it was up to the discretion of the officer to issue a citation (usually if the violation is at the place of business) or to make a report to the Liquor Commission. In the first case, the officer must have decided to handle it administratively. Mr. Tye believed since it involved an of age intoxicated person, it became more of a licensure situation rather than if it involved an underage. Mr. Tye also confirmed that since this is a Special Designated License, the Council has the ability to approve or deny in which case it does not go on to the State. When the Council reviews liquor renewals or new applications, those recommendations go on to the Liquor Control Commission to either approve or deny. In this proceeding, it is a matter of the Council's evaluation of whether they believe he will be in compliance with the liquor laws at this event and if he will use appropriate safeguards to make sure that those laws are enforced. Any prior history of violations could be used in the evaluation. Regarding the recent incidents there has been no final determination at this point and is still pending. This would be like someone receiving a citation, but still having the opportunity to challenge that in a court proceeding.

City Manager stated to clarify this is not a citation; it is more of an administrative report to the Liquor Commission. The police officer could have cited in the case of the minor, but there must be some criteria they looked at to determine if there are sufficient grounds to cite or forward. The normal license renewal process will soon be brought before the Council and it is possible we still will not have the final decision at that time if the hearing is in October.

Vice-President Buschkoetter stated that he came to this meeting prepared to probably deny this application. If what Mr. Hibbs has stated is true, he did not know what more diligent actions he could have taken to prevent the two situations that occurred. If what he stated is not true, he would be voting to deny in future when things come up for Shooters.

Council member Lear asked what changes Mr. Hibbs has made since these two incidents. Mr. Hibbs stated that they refuse to admit anyone with an ID that they question at all. If people come in visibly intoxicated, he does not let them in. He has been a little more vigilant about this since the two incidents because he knows they are now being watched more closely. He now has two people at the door, one to card and one to watch the crowd. They have not had any disturbances reported at his bar in the past year and any drunk or disorderly people are made to leave. He and his assistant manager are walking around the bar, making sure everyone is okay, especially on busy weekends.

Council member Lear said he hoped that Mr. Hibbs could appreciate that this puts the Council in a difficult position. If at this wedding something goes wrong after the Council

approves with two pending items, they also end up being culpable. That is his hesitation on approval. It was pointed out by Council member Lammers, that they are faced with that situation every time they approve a Special Designated License.

City Manager stated these two reports arose from someone reporting them, not necessarily that Shooter was being watched by law enforcement. Chief Lynch is concerned about incidents like these and that is why they were forwarded to the Liquor Commission. Clearly a SDL is different; it is an unusual case before the Council where there are no findings at this point. It might be even harder in a few weeks when Council reviews the license renewals. It might be more appropriate for the Chief to comment at that time. Council member Lear stated he believed that the Liquor Commission would more likely approve the license renewal, but could revoke it based on the outcome of the pending violations and past history.

City Attorney stated one of the unique aspects of this is that the report came after the two individuals were at different locations so that is why it was referred on to the Liquor Commission for administrative action on the license based on that type of information.

Mr. Hibbs stated he has catered two off-premise events in North Platte where he also has a bar and two in Kearney, plus the Cattleman's Classic which was a 5-day event with no incidents. His North Platte location has not had any liquor violations.

Council member Lear stated he does not usually rethink his decision on the fly, but decided to change his mind and approve after the discussion at this meeting. Council member Lammers stated what made him rethink his denial decision is the fact that both events happened away from the business and are based (at this point) on no proven facts with questionable circumstances. Vice-President Buschkoetter added there was also time and space before the reports. He stated that if Shooters is found guilty in these matters, he would no longer be supportive of any further SDL for them.

Regarding the September 18th wedding event, Mr. Hibbs stated he will have people carding, providing wristbands and he and a couple of people will be monitoring the crowd. He also knows the people that he is catering the event for and did not believe they would do anything that would cause him to be in a violation situation.

VII. REPORTS

UPDATE ON NSP GRANT TO DEMOLISH ST. LUKE'S HOME

Assistant to the City Manager Suzanne Brodine stated the St. Luke's property came before the Council for NSP funds at a prior meeting to discuss the demolition of that structure. Since that meeting, the State Historical Preservation Office has approved that demolition. They had requested additional information which was submitted. The Director from the Heritage Nebraska group came out and looked at the building and they approved it for demolition. She just wanted the Council to be aware they have gone through all of the steps that are required by the State. Vice-President Buschkoetter stated that the Buffalo County Historical Society had requested that the City go through the process that was just outlined.
